I'm not in a position to comment on the relevance of subjects in respect of NEP, but there could beore additions to the practical components and make it more practical oriented rather than theory. The ultimate goal being, bridging the gap between academia & actual court practice.

The syllabus needs to be reconsidered as the old chapters are unnecessary

I believe students should be acquainted with practical Court functions at a very early stage and not just the final 2 semesters. Some TASKS where the students should form an opinion and get a knack on how to approach a civil issue and criminal issue...there has to be an evolution process. Stressing only on moot Court, analysis and presentation would help the student only in a limited manner.

We didn't get optional subject in 6th sem. Even the one which was offered got removed at the last moment saying we do not have facilities for those subjects. Now i have to do those courses somewhere outside so can catch up with my career options.

I would only suggest that the practical component in the final year to involve more internships and projects instead of writing work. And i really appreciate our teachers efforts to add projects like-lok adalat, interview techniques & Socio-legal Project as part of practical component, projects like these including internships really helped us to have a glance at the practical law life that we were about to enter in.

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REPORT ON FEEDBACK FROM STUDENTS ON CURRICULUM

Most of the students are of the view that he syllabus prescribed for the various law programmes are applicable to their chosen career and has also helped them for further studies. In addition to this it has also helped them for entrepreneurship and placement opportunities in various law firms and lawyers chambers and it has also sensitised them towards community and social needs through legal aid programmes and as para legal volunteers.

Also majority of the students are of the opinion that the courses are organized well in the curriculum, while a few feel that there is no clear link between the courses and there is a need to revise and include more courses in the curriculum. They also agree to the view that the curriculum also motivates them for future career and personal development. Few are of the view that some courses do not have practical applicability and that it is too extensive in each semester.

Majority of the students agree that the curriculum includes national perspective but not global perspective and latest development.

As regards the e-learning resources, they are of the view that they are very good. Most of them feel that the practical component in the syllabus needs a reconsideration. They also want more optional subjects. Majority of them feel that involving alumni as subject experts for imparting curriculum would be beneficial for the students. Most of the students are also of the view that the courses are relevant to their professional practice.

Some students are of the view that the syllabus is in tune with NEP. They were also of the view that more stress should be laid on the practical courses
